# Our Role

#### We advance the legal, civil & human rights of Georgians with disabilities

The GAO is Georgia's federally mandated protection and advocacy agency, established by the DD Act in 1977. We align our resources, values, and legal commitments to grow a movement of people in Georgia who willingly stand beside — and stand up for — people with disabilities.

## Core Belief

#### People with disabilities are fully equal members of our communities

People with disabilities have the right to self-determination, protection from harm and the opportunity to fully exercise their citizenship and responsibilities.

# **Priorities**

#### We have four main areas of emphasis

Our highest priority is preventing abuse, neglect, and preventable deaths We support people with disabilities to access services and supports. We assist people to fully participate in community life. We support children to live with permanent, loving families.

## **Activities**

### We use a range of remedies to achieve our goals and objectives

Our range of remedies includes individual and systemic advocacy, investigations, support for self-advocacy, negotiation, information and referral, administrative remedies, and when necessary, litigation.

## Access

## Our access authority is the foundation of our work

We monitor and investigate where people with disabilities live and receive services — like group homes, institutions, or jails — to make sure they're safe and treated with respect. GAO talks with people, reviews records, and investigates concerns about abuse or neglect to protect their rights.
